PRACTICE TIPS

As we began our new season of ringing we ran a series of practice tips and posters on Facebook. These tips were shared by members of the ensemble. If you are not on Facebook we invite you to join us by LIKING us on Facebook. https://www.facebook.com/HoustonBronze/

Tip #1: As I first begin to go over my music, I mark the pages where there is a problem spot. As I practice, I never start where the problem is but always back up a measure or two. The problems may be in the transition to that measure which sets up the mistake. Time is valuable. I may not play through the entire piece each day, but I know where I need to work first. Start SLOWLY and play it correctly!

Tip #2: My method of practice depends on what I need to work on. If it's early in the semester and I have several pieces to look at (meaning several different positions), I go over trouble spots with spoons and forks. Spoons for naturals and forks for sharps/flats. No knives. Quick weaving passages would get dangerous, even with butter knives. This can really help with figuring out weaving and bell change choreography. The muscle movements aren't exactly equivalent, but it's close enough for the early stages. If it's later in the season and I just have one or two trouble spots to work on in particular, I will actually take those bells home and practice off of the foot of my bed with the bells themselves. I have collaborated with other ringers as well, for figuring out difficult passages. If all else fails, I at least look through my music in the evening to keep it fresh in my mind.

Tip #3: Start slowly and practice with a metronome. Begin practicing difficult passages slow enough so that you can play it correctly. If you go too fast and continue to make mistakes, slow it down!! Otherwise you are simply practicing your mistakes. Once you can play it several times in a row correctly then and only then should you bump the tempo up a few ticks. Take your time. The race is not won by rushing ahead. Progress may have periods when you push forward quickly but hit a wall. Don't be discouraged. Simply keep up the practice and you will succeed. As you do this methodical practice, you are also practicing the

muscle memory necessary to eventually play the passage up to tempo.

Tip #4: COMMIT As we began our year with our initial business meeting, we talked about the commitment of each ringer to the ensemble. The level of that commitment from each ringer in practice and fulfilling other responsibilities of the ensemble is crucial to our success.

Tip #5: My piano professor in college told me two things that have stuck with me, as far as practicing goes: slow it down until you can play it correctly, and play it 5 times right for every 1 time wrong. He said that practice doesn't make perfect, practice makes permanent. The more times you play it right, even if it's painfully slow, the more you solidify your muscle memory. And anyone who has every played any kind of music knows that muscle memory is absolutely key to playing well under the pressure of a concert or recital. And the only way for muscle memory to form is by repetition. Make sure that your repetitions are correct... the muscle memory is forming, whether you want it to or not, so make sure your muscles are remembering how to play it right!

Tip #6: I use empty bottles to practice complicated bell changes, and commit movement to muscle memory. Pier 1 or World Market usually has a good selection of decorative bottles in various sizes to match the size and weight of the bells I play. If needed, a dry erase marker is used to mark the bottles.

Tip #7: Before even picking up a bell, I begin my at home practice by studying the music looking for key signatures and places where they change, dynamic markings, tempo markings and tempo changes, and accidentals. If available, I like to listen to a recording of the piece while following along. Kitchen utensils then make great practice tools. Since I often play treble 4-in-hand positions, I use wooden spoons for the 6's, plastic spoons for the 7's, and rubber scrapers for chimes. (Some days this requires washing dishes first!) At first, I go slowly to build muscle memory, work out coordination issues of making bell changes, and master tricky rhythms. As the semester progresses and notes are learned, my practice becomes more focused on mental review making sure I know where I'm turning the page and what's coming up next on each page turn, where I'm changing bells, what the next dynamic marking is, etc. When I can see and hear the music in my sleep, I feel confident about being prepared for concerts!

About The Houston Bronze Ensemble

The Houston Bronze Ensemble is a professional, auditioned, handbell ensemble made up of musicians from the greater Houston area. The founders of HBE, Jeff Weiss, Christine Anderson, and Hart Morris, met for lunch one day in 1988 looking for a way for Houston area handbell directors to have a place to play. They began by writing on a napkin the names of the people who might want to be a part of this ensemble. This was our beginning. In the fall of 1988 Hart Morris became the first director of Houston Bronze. After Hart moved to Memphis, Tennessee, the ensemble rang under the musical direction of arranger and composer Margaret (Maggi) R. Tucker until 1994. During the 1995 season, the group rang ensemble style with various ringers, including G.W. 'Dub' Shepherd, Andrew Bowen and David Vander-Meer, directing the ensemble. Conductors since then included David VanderMeer, Dolan Bayless, Ben Harris, Ruth Seiwell and James Roberts. Bill Nave was appointed the artistic director in August 2014.

The ensemble celebrated its 25th Anniversary year in 2014. In December 2014, Houston Bronze Ensemble was honored with an invitation to perform with the Houston Symphony as a part of their Family Concert Series. In July 2015, the ensemble was invited to and performed at Pinnacle 2015 held in Dallas, TX.

The ensemble rehearses every Tuesday evening with a focus on excellence in precision and expression. The ensemble plays a variety of genres of music but always with the goal of excellence.
