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## Reflections of a Rookie Ringer By Jimmy Clark

My journey started with an email to Bill Nave, the artistic director of Houston Bronze, this past summer

asking about auditions for the Houston Bronze Ensemble. Auditions had been held a couple of months earlier, but I was hoping for at least one empty spot, or to possibly be added to the substitute ringer roster. I had played handbells since college, even spent a few years as a director of an advanced church-based handbell choir, so I thought I was up to the challenge. I mention the director part only because during this time I think I had played every bell we had (sometimes while directing) when a substitute ringer was not available, so technically, I Some better than others. can play any position. After hearing there was one more audition opportunity, I prepared by practicing ringing and weaving techniques, using handbells, wooden spoons, empty bottles or anything else I could get my hands on. I pulled music out of my library to assess my sight reading skills, which needed some work, but felt I was ready for the audition. I wish my audition performance matched my level of confidence, but sadly that was not the case (anxiety got the best of me); however, I was invited to join the ensemble, ringing primarily lower bass bells.


This is the part where I highlight some differences between a church-based handbell choir and a professional ensemble. A predictable topic, but indulge me. Rehearsals started and ended much like I was used to, but setup took longer because of the seven octaves of bells (plus duplicate bells), silver melody bells, Petit & Fritsen bells, cymbells, chimes, and percussion (cowbell included). I faced a steep learning curve as the music was at a higher level than I was used to in my church handbell choir, and there was much more to learn than the one or two pieces played during worship services every month or so. Rehearsals had a serious tone, were intense, and challenged my abilities as a musician and a member of a professional ensemble.

Prior to Houston Bronze, the largest bell I had played was C3, a bell used in many church handbell choirs, but still considered a luxury depending on the budget and available ringers. I was quickly introduced to the C2, which weighs in at almost 20 pounds and close to 20 inches tall. The music for the Christmas program was challenging enough, but learning to maneuver the larger bells took several weeks. We changed positions for each piece so I got a break from the larger bells. With 17 ringers on the roster, instead of the typical 15, we had two extra ringers each piece to play percussion, pick up extra bells, or sit out if not needed.

After a few months of rehearsals, it was time for the Christmas concerts. It was hard work getting to this point, but I was looking forward to friends and family hearing what I had spent months working towards. I was expecting a certain amount of performance anxiety for the first concert, but I was not expecting how emotional I would get during the second song in our program, "On Christmas Day in the Morn" arranged by Fred Gramann. This happens to be one of my favorites, and the one in which I sit out. I stood slightly off stage with my eyes closed listening to beautiful music played by some of the most talented musicians I know. Afterwards, I wiped away a few tears and joined the ensemble for the rest of the program, ending with Wizards in Winter. Now that it is a fun one to play.

Now for some takeaways from my experience. If you are a director, encourage your ringers to experiment playing different bells. Challenge them with music not necessarily at the level they are now, but where they want to be. If you are a ringer, let go of the idea that you must play every bell assigned in every piece of music. Ask for help, and help others. Encourage each other to go past the notes on the page and ring musically. And finally, practice on your own outside of rehearsals. There is one more piece of advice audition for Houston Bronze Ensemble. Follow us on Facebook for more information about auditions in the coming months. Would I do this all over again? You bet, and I am! The spring concert is just under 4 months away!

"People with disabilities can make beautiful music with handbells. Don't believe that? Just listen to the Brookwood Handbell Choir!


Located on a beautiful acreage west of Houston in Brookshire, Texas, Brookwood is a God-centered, educational community, where adults with special needs have meaningful jobs and live life abundantly... without government funding.

The Brookwood Handbell Choir is composed of 16 citizens who have mastered playing music with colored scrolls and a set of 3-octave handbells. The system was adapted from the Handbell Musicians of America under the leadership of world renowned pianist, Linda McKechnie, in 2007.

The Brookwood Handbell Choir has played for numerous churches, senior groups, private luncheons, and the Houston Astros – where they rang the National Anthem! Their most recent performances include ringing for the Houston Grand Opera, the Houston Symphony, the Brookwood Spring Gala and the Brookwood Volunteer Benefit Luncheon. They also perform regularly at Brookwood for many special occasions."

To begin with, it gave me a much better appreciation for just how lucky I have been to grow up in bell programs that really developed my skills, without them I would not have been able to focus so much on improving my musicianship throughout the ring-in. The part I enjoyed the most was being in an environment where everyone had a true passion and talent for ringing, allowing me to focus more on musical refinement with precision as a whole and as Michael Joy put it, really "feeling the music" rather than just reading notes off the page. I have already begun to take this experience and translate it into ringing within the Baylor group. The experience has fine tuned my attention to detail and has pushed me to take ringing in my life down a more serious path.

#### From Nathan


CRI was quite the experience for me... I've only been ringing consistently since August 2016 (before which I'd had minimal experience around handbells, though having an extensive musical background served as a wonderful catalyst). One of the things I enjoyed most about CRI while I was there was the incredible musicality of all the musicians. It's a thrilling experience to be surrounded by musicians who are so keyed into the music. The experience I gained over the three days, has encouraged me to pursue any opportunity to mentor other musicians. One such example is teaching new ringers about the basics of handbells and encouraging their interest. Mentoring others through music has been a passion of mine, and I believe my experiences with CRI have given me a wider scope through which I can help others.

#### From Elizabeth

While in Dallas ... the energy in the room when we played together was palpable; everyone in the room was connected with the music and with each other. Handbells is about so much more than playing the notes we see on the page, and we took it beyond. I learned that when you really look at everything the composer has put on the page, it paints a clearer picture in your head of what's going on (be it what they were thinking when they wrote it or what you're imagining in your own mind), and that gives emotional enrichment to the music that you make.

We talked about the idea of the body being an instrument, and the body being an extension of the bell, as well as how we use our sagittal space to augment transitions in the music. That really resonated with me because watching everyone else and their different styles of ringing, I saw how much ringing is a visual art form as much as it is aural.

Needless to say, without College Ring-In, I wouldn't have had the opportunity to spend time working with and learning from other amazing musicians, becoming a better ringer and sharing my passion in the process. It was wonderful that this event was able to bring together young people in the handbell community to ring together and create friendships and talk about new ideas. It was a great musical moment for me, and I'm going to keep trying to get the handbell choir at Syracuse started up again, because I think I would miss bells too much if I didn't.

## About The Houston Bronze Ensemble

The Houston Bronze Ensemble is a professional, auditioned, handbell ensemble made up of musicians from the greater Houston area. The founders of HBE, Jeff Weiss, Christine Anderson, and Hart Morris, met for lunch one day in 1988 looking for a way for Houston area handbell directors to have a place to play. They began by writing on a napkin the names of the people who might want to be a part of this ensemble. This was our beginning. In the fall of 1988 Hart Morris became the first director of Houston Bronze. After Hart moved to Memphis, Tennessee, the ensemble rang under the musical direction of arranger and composer Margaret (Maggi) R. Tucker until 1994. During the 1995 season, the group rang ensemble style with various ringers, including G.W. 'Dub' Shepherd, Andrew Bowen and David Vander-Meer, directing the ensemble. Conductors since then included David VanderMeer, Dolan Bayless, have Ben Harris, Ruth Seiwell and James Roberts. Bill Nave was appointed the artistic director in August 2014.

The ensemble celebrated its 25th Anniversary year in 2014. In December 2014, Houston Bronze Ensemble was honored with an invitation to perform with the Houston Symphony as a part of their Family Concert Series. In July 2015, the ensemble was invited to and performed at Pinnacle 2015 held in Dallas, TX.

The ensemble rehearses every Tuesday evening with a focus on excellence in precision and expression. The ensemble plays a variety of genres of music but always with the goal of excellence.

Houston Bronze Ensemble holds a 501(c)(3) non-profit status.
