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




## A Note from our Artistic Director—Sondra Tucker

## A Red Carpet Night with Brookwood



## Music: My Peace Bringer by DruEllen Duncan

In real life, I'm a teacher. I get to hang out with 9 and 10 year olds during the day. This past week in class, my kids and I read an article about the history of two popular children's games, and how throughout history, games have helped people through tough times. During the height of COVID, Roblox, an online children's game, found a 40% increase in usage, mainly due to the fact that it

was a way for kids to "talk" to their friends and "play" with their friends while everyone was in quarantine. Candyland was invented in 1948, by a teacher no less, when she saw rows and rows of children stuck in a hospital ward due to polio for months on end, bored. The article went on to say how games, like Monopoly and Sorry!, were popular during the Great Depression. Since money was tight and families couldn't afford to go out, they stayed in. Games gave them an outlet to find enjoyment.

I asked my kids what strategies they, or even the adults in their family, had to help if they were having a tough or stressful time. The saying is true, "Kids say the darndest things!" I heard answers such as: draw pictures, read a book, eat chocolate ("That's what my mom always does." What teachers learn about the families of their students would probably embarrass the adults they live with!), reach for the ice cream "straight out of the carton", and cuddle with my teddy bear. Those are just a few.

That got me to thinking about what I do in a stressful time. Chocolate is definitely a go-to. Ice cream ranks up there, too. Getting a hug from my son can solve a world of problems. But I think my main go-to is music. There is plenty of research out there to say that chocolate, specifically dark chocolate, can help relieve stress. I've found articles dating back from 2009 to January of this year that can support that claim. The articles for research on ice-cream seem to go back and forth as far as if ice cream is good for relieving stress or if it is just a temporary sugar high. As far as hugs, I found an amazing article that gives me "20 Amazing Benefits of Hugging According to Science." And there are so many more articles to back up the research of the benefits of hugs. But even more than that, there are thousands of articles that can back up the claim that music can help calm, relieve stress, and reduce anxiety.

Of course, when I start listening to music, I'm not thinking about what the research says. I'm thinking about how the music makes me feel. When I'm in a sad mood, I don't go for the totally energetic, bouncy, happy music; I turn to the mellow, low-key tones. When I'm in an excited mood, that's when the bouncy, happy, energetic tunes start to play, most of the time very loudly. And to be perfectly honest, my not-so-great voice is singing loudly along with them (this is why I keep my classroom door closed when I have my music playing after school). You don't normally think about being stressed and being in an excited mood at the same time, but there are times that they just tend to go together, such as when you're getting ready for the last day before Christmas break. The kids' presents need to be put together, the party supplies have to be lined out to make sure you have everything needed, the parent's presents have to be wrapped, and so on. It's an exciting time, but it is definitely a very stressful time. And let's just say that they can hear Christmas music in the next hall over.

Not only does listening to music help relieve stress but playing a musical instrument can also help you decompress. It's true. Tuesday nights, for example, we gather together for rehearsal. The Ensemble members come from all over the area, from all different areas of occupations or are retired. Some members come in relaxed, but some come flying in, running late, because something went wrong at work, or traffic was a killer on the drive in, many different reasons. Shoulders are tight when we start ringing. But as the evening goes on, the shoulders start to relax. Tension eases. The smiles to come to the surface. Music: the great medicine begins to take over.

During rehearsal, we do tend to come up against some bumpy spots that we must work through. (We wouldn't have to keep going back to work on them if we had it already figured out, right?) But even as we're working and working and working and working and sometimes, even working some more, on those bumpy spots, because we're there together and playing music, it doesn't seem as if it is actually work. It doesn't become what one would think that something so tedious should become. I guess because music brings me a sense of calmness, it doesn't become such a stressful situation for me. Now, there are times that I do get frustrated and irritated, mostly at myself, but it goes away almost as quickly as it comes on. Music: my peace bringer.

I hope you have something to use to help you, what I call, decompress. Something that when your shoulders are tight you can do to help you loosen up and relax. I'm all for the chocolate, but that does tend to have a negative effect on the hips if you eat too much. I'm all for the ice cream; just watch out for the brain freeze. I'm all for hugs, except when the smell of the teenager precedes him and he is dripping in sweat. (Although sometimes I plug my nose and hug him anyway, cringing when I feel the sweat through his shirt.) But there's rarely a time when you can go wrong with music. It may take you a little bit to find the right song or the right station to listen to, but I'm pretty sure that there is something out there for everyone. So, turn on the music, and don't be afraid to turn it up! There is probably someone out there who will sing along with you.



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## About the Houston Bronze Ensemble

The Houston Bronze Ensemble is a professional, auditioned, handbell ensemble made up of musicians from the greater Houston area. Known as Houston's premier handbell choir, the ensemble performs regular concerts in the winter and spring as well as at community events, regional and national handbell events, weddings, and private parties. In 2014 HBE had the honor of performing with the Houston Symphony. The group plays a wide variety of musical genres, always with the goal of EXCELLENCE.

Founded in 1988. Houston Bronze Ensemble was started as an avenue for Houston area handbell directors to have a place to ring. A lunchtime meeting with Jeff Weiss, Christine Anderson and Hart Morris in attendance and with only a napkin to write the names of those who might be interested is what started it all. The rest, as they say, is history. In the fall of 1988, Hart Morris became the first director of Houston Bronze. After Hart moved to Tennessee. the ensemble rang under the direction of Margaret R. Tucker. In the 1995 season, the group rang ensemble style with various ringers, including G.W. Shepherd, Andrew Bowen, and David VanderMeer, directing the ensemble. Artistic Directors since then have included David VanderMeer, Dolan Bayless, Ben Harris, Ruth Seiwell, James Roberts and Bill Nave. Sondra Tucker was appointed the artistic director in June 2022.

Houston Bronze recognizes the importance of investing in the future of handbell ringing. We offer a variety of educational opportunities designed to meet the unique needs of churches and schools who wish to build or improve their handbell program. Workshops designed to meet the specific needs of a choir, mini concerts, and petting zoos are a sample of what we provide to the Houston area handbell community. Houston Bronze also offers scholarships to students wishing to attend College Ring-In, an event sponsored by Handbell Musicians of America.
